### A Sesquicentennial Summer

There is something for everyone as we move into the summer season celebrating the 150th year of our church. Even our building has donned a new "dress" with her newly painted walls and new carpeting. The Outdoor Chapel has been refreshed and the surrounding landscape is sprinkled with spring flowers that will soon give way to the hearty blossoms of summer. Our commitment to service, fellowship and worship is ongoing, but this summer, we have three opportunities to come together as we stay in love with God.

We still need a few volunteers to help with the collection of food for our local Help and Hope Center on June 22. Three King Soopers locations (Ridge Road, Castle Pines, and Highlands Ranch) provide the space, and Help and Hope the list of food items to be requested as shoppers pass through their doors. Volunteers are encouraged to wear the sesquicentennial teeshirt and sunscreen and to bring a portable chair and a bottle of water for their two-hour shift.

Next up will be the Old Time Ice Cream Social on Sunday, July 7, complete with a lunch of hot dogs, chips, drinks, and several tasty options of ice cream following the 10 am worship service. There will be games and contests for the young folks and a quilt display in the Sanctuary. You may take a place around the table and tie knots with the Knot Again quilters as they prepare a blanket for their ongoing project. Watch for details in the July newsletter and our regular communication spots.

We will once again be providing water bottles to the Douglas County Fair parade watchers on Saturday morning, July 27. Volunteers (encouraged once again to wear the commemorative teeshirt) will be needed to prepare the bottles ahead of time and to distribute them along the parade route. Both activities promise a time of fellowship and outreach.

On August 25 we will honor the church founding with a rededication worship service at 10am. This is a date close to the origin of FUMC-CR: 150 years ago, on August 13, 1874, a Certificate of Incorporation was filed and Rev. A.C. Brooks, who had preached his first sermon on May 17, 1874, was officially named as the first minister. We will honor the day by inviting district leadership and former members to join in the celebration. Post cards will be available for members to invite their family, friends, and neighbors. A community pot luck follows this service.

August 25 is also the target date for completing the updated history of FUMC-CR, being gathered and compiled so thoroughly by Laryce Nitsch and her history committee (Donna Murray, Brenda Ryan, Marcia Noble, Joe Gschwendtner and Theresa Packard). While a booklet of the first hundred years already exists, the new booklet will cover church history from 1974-2024.

But wait! There's more! Moving into the fall, all groups within the church, from Little Blessings and Community Kids to youth and adult, will be involved with our "Star Project," decorating small stars to hang on a tree in Festival Park at the Annual Star Lighting in November. We'll even have a table ready at the ice cream social to inaugurate this project.

But wait, there's even more! Photographs! Our needs here are two-fold. We want as many photographs from this year's events as possible — not just these special events, but the seasonal celebrations of Easter, Advent, Christmas, and activities like the Youth Mission Trip, Time and Talent, small group dinners, and other outreach and mission projects. A book containing a pictorial history of our sesquicentennial is being planned for January of 2025. It will sit alongside our printed updated of the past 50 years of our church, a visual reminder of who we were in 2024 as we move forward as a church. When you take photographs during these events, please share your best with our sesquicentennial team.

Secondly, we would love to have you share any photographs of your ancestors, whether they were pioneer settlers in the territory or not. Each of us has traveled various routes to come into this particular community of faith. Your ancestors paved the way for you to be here now. We'd like to add these photos to the history kiosk that sits at the back of the sanctuary and keep them up through All Saints Day. We will copy your photo and post the copy for all to see, returning the original to you undamaged. Simply place your photo(s) in a protective envelope with your name and a brief description of those in there photo and leave it at the church office, or you may scan your photo and send it to Julie Bailey at juliesings@gmail.com. The roots of our church family tree reach far and wide.

The Sesquicentennial Steering Committee, as you can see, has been busy, but we could not present these events without the support of all who have volunteered. Check with Pastor Matt or Julie Bailey if you have ideas you'd like to share or projects you'd like to participate in.

As we start our six weeks looking at the Gospel of Mark I was reading Mark 1:40-45 CEB

"A man with a skin disease approached Jesus, fell to his knees, and begged, "If you want, you can make me clean." Incensed, Jesus reached out his hand, touched him, and said, "I do want to. Be clean." Instantly, the skin disease left him, and he was clean. Sternly, Jesus sent him away, saying, "Don't say anything to anyone. Instead, go and show yourself to the priest and offer the sacrifice for your cleansing that Moses commanded. This will be a testimony to them." Instead, he went out and started talking freely and spreading the news so that Jesus wasn't able to enter a town openly. He remained outside in deserted places, but people came to him from everywhere." ~https://bible.com/bible/37/mrk.1.40-45.CEB

I always like to ask myself what can I learn from this reading? Here are three things that perked up for me.

- <u>Compassion over convention</u>: In Jesus' day, touching a person with a skin disease was taboo, as it rendered one ritually unclean. In the scripture we noticed that Jesus prioritizes compassion over convention, demonstrating that love and human dignity transcend societal and religious boundaries. Has there been a situation where you have shown compassion in the last week?
- <u>Spreading the Good News</u>: The healed man can't contain his joy and spreads the news of his healing. Similarly, we are invited to share the transformative power of God's love and justice with the world. In doing so, we share the love and light of God with our community and beyond. When was the last time you shared your faith with someone?
- <u>More than healing</u>: The story of Jesus healing a man with a skin disease is more than a miracle; it is a call to action. It challenges us to embody radical compassion, break down barriers of exclusion, and actively engage in the healing and transformation of our world. Could you imagine if Jesus did not heal the man or if the man did not share his healing?

Notice the cost of Jesus caring for the man meant that he could not enter towns unnoticed from this point on, yet people still sought him out for healing and teaching. Was it worth it, I think so...

#### Single Board Governance Model

Dan Hotchkiss in his book Governance and Ministry wrote: "Governance is holding the whole institution and its work in trust, voicing its intentions, and taking responsibility for its performance. Ministry is the rest of what a congregation does—the daily work of building a community, managing resources, and transforming lives."

The Committee on Nominations and Leadership Development has approved a plan to adjust our governance structure to what is known as a single-board model. There is a copy of the proposed plan on the Website under the Virtual Office.

The single-board model helps with transparency and accountability. I have experienced it in my last two churches and have found the structure very healthy for churches to function. It was the change in the Single Board that helped the Tahlequah Church pivot when COVID hit. In essence, it will be like a non-profit board. We will still have a space for the personal team to operate in the fashion of the SPRC. I am working on a date to have a town hall meeting about this change.

#### May 30, 2024

To the members of the Mountain Sky Conference,

On May 30, 2024, former President Donald Trump was found guilty in a legal case of falsifying business records to influence the outcome of the 2016 election. It is the first time in the history of the United States that a president has been convicted of a crime. The jury's decision will undoubtably further highlight the political divide that has fractured our nation in recent years. Its impact will be felt in our communities and in our relationships with co-workers, friends, and family.

In a nation where civility is already in short supply, what are we who follow Jesus called to model? What values shall we embody that can offer a healing witness in the face of such brokenness? What words shall we speak, what actions shall we take?

Jesus calls us to a life of love. Love is not an easy out. In fact, it is the hardest work we can undertake. Love invites us to enter into relationships of mutual accountability. When others disappoint us--when we disappoint ourselves--love keeps us moving in the direction of repentance and reconciliation. Love calls us to remain openhearted to those who have transgressed. Love always leads to greater justice, deeper wholeness, and healthier communities.

How we live in response to former President Trump's conviction can either strengthen integrity, service, and the democratic foundation of this country, or it can further erode it.

Heed these words from Galatians 6: 1-2:

"My siblings, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you yourselves are not tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."

In a world that defaults to simple soundbites, easy answers, and divisive politics, may we in the Mountain Sky Conference bear witness to the God who perfects us through Love. In the face of the complexities of our current age, may we remember that we are followers of the Prince of Peace, who invites us all into a life of Love.

It is the only pathway that can lead us all to Beloved Community.

Today, in Mark (Chapter # you just read), is there a particular teaching or story that feels relevant to your life today? How can this message from the past be applied to the challenges of the modern world?
