Thank you Church for your generous support of our Mission Encounter – Douglas County Sheriff's Detention Center Backpack Ministry. Nearly all the cards for supplies and cash were picked up on Sunday, April 24th and most of the supplies and cash have already been received. Your support of our Backpack Ministry provides 48 backpacks (36 for men and 12 for women) for indigent people being released from the Detention Center.

We also include a New Testament and other devotional material to help these men and women get their life on track with God's help.

Moments in Methodist Church History

A few months ago, we provided some introductory information on Father John Dyer, and our History Night speakers mentioned his contribution to the growth of the Methodist Church in Colorado. His autobiography, The Snowshoe Itinerant is available at our local library (in-library use only) and for purchase on Amazon. Here are a few more facts about Father Dyer (whose grave is in Cedar Hill Cemetery):

- "Father" Dyer is one of the 16 founders of the state of Colorado, thus his likeness is depicted in stained glass in the Colorado capital dome in Denver
- Father Dyer Peak in the Ten Mile Range is named for him.
- In Breckenridge, Colorado, a Methodist Church is named for Father Dyer.
- In Fairplay, Colorado, at the South Park City Museum, the Dyer Memorial Chapel is named for Father Dyer.
- In 1977 he was one of the first inductees into the Colorado Ski & Snowboarding Museum Hall of Fame.
- Near Turquoise Lake, outside Leadville, Colorado, stands the Father Dyer Campground.
- Out of Leadville, the Father Dyer Postal Race was named for him, North America's highest ski mountaineering race,
- The Colorado ghost town of Dyersville was named for him.{Source: Wikipedia}

My mother has been with Jesus for more than 20 years. She passed the Saturday before Mother's Day and it took several years before I could brave a Mother's Day church service. Time has eased the pain of separation. Mother's Day provides a space to reflect on what a blessing she was to me.

In addition to celebrating our mothers who are with us this Mother's Day, I want to remind all of us to take the time to remember that special person who was such a major part in making us who we are. Our mothers were an instrument in God's hand to bring us into this world. God knit us together in our mother's womb (Psalm 139:13) and placed us into her arms at birth. What a joy and blessing it is for a mother to cradle her newborn child for the first time at birth and then to hold her child's hand throughout life.

That's how God intended it to be. Mothers (and fathers, too) are a gift from God to the child, just as much as a child is a gift from God given to their parents. We are blessed by the special bond that is there in the parent/child relationship.

The love of a mother for her child is the closest thing to the love of God for mankind and especially His love for His children. Make Mother's Day a grace-filled day of letting go of life's little issues, and taking captive every warm and wonderful memory of Mom. Hide those memories in your heart.

One day memories will be all you have ... and beautiful memories will be sufficient to take your glass from half-full to overflowing. Honor God by honoring your mother in your mind and with your actions, and the love that God has given you will pour forth in love for others.

John Wesley the founder of the United Methodist Church was deeply influenced by his mother Susanna. She was the devoted mother of at least nineteen children, ten of whom lived to adulthood. When the children were small, she developed a remarkable and effective method of education and spiritual nurture. Even into adulthood, Susanna would nurture her adult children in their faith.

In order to perform this duty aright, grant us grace to preserve a sober, equal temper, and sincerity to pray for your assistance. Amen.

Did you know????

In 1784, John Wesley dispatched Thomas Coke from England to oversee the founding of the Methodist Episcopal Church in America. Coke met Francis Asbury at Barratt's Chapel in November. Plans were quickly made to gather all Methodist preachers together for the Christmas Conference at Lovely Lane in Baltimore, Maryland, and the Methodist Episcopal Church was formed. This is known as the first General Conference.
